Peter Bloxidge

Hi, I'm Peter, the Associate Conductor for CAOS this year. It's my job to help out Francesca with the weekly practises and rehearse one or two of the pieces with the orchestra. I have never actually studied music professionally, but I have been a bit of a keen amateur, previously conducting the university Concert Bands at both Southampton and York, as well as conducting CAOS briefly last year, which led to applying for the role this year. I'm so grateful to the orchestra for working so hard this term!

The Choir

Smile: This song was composed in 1936 by Charlie Chaplin for his movie "Modern Times" that depicts the life of a factory worker during the great depression. However, it was only in 1954 that John Turner and Geoffrey Parsons added the lyrics, which were still inspired by the theme of the film: everything will be fine, if you just smile.

Beyond the sea: In 1945, the French artist Charles Trenet wrote "La Mer", an homage to the beautiful landscapes of the South of France. The song became an international success when the American version by Jack Lawrence was released. In this version the poem is turned into a love song that became the jazz hit we know today. It has been sung by numerous artists, in many languages including Italian, German and even Russian.

What a Wonderful World: This all-time classic was written by Bob Thiele and George David Weiss. They offered it first to Tony Bennett who turned it down, and it was then released in 1967 by Louis Armstrong. Although the single was initially not a huge success in the US, it reached number one in the UK. The song has since been featured in many movies such as "Good morning Vietnam" "12 Monkeys" and "Bowling for Columbine".

If Ye Love Me: Perhaps one of Thomas Tallis' most loved and frequently performed anthems, 'If Ye Love Me' is a setting of a passage from the Gospel of John and is an example of an early English motet. A very popular choice for church choirs, it has been sung for many occasions, including the wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle in 2018.

Locus Iste: Completed in 1869, Anton Bruckner's setting of the gradual 'Locus Iste' is one of the most famous. The text translates to; "This place was made by God, an inestimable sacrament, it is without reproach." Often performed for the anniversaries of church dedication, this sacred motet is another favourite of choirs of all standards.

Os Justi: Another of Bruckner's sacred motets, 'Os Justi' was composed in 1879 and published in 1886 together with 'Locus Iste' and two other graduals – 'Christus Factus Est' and 'Virga Jesse'. Bruckner had originally added an extra verse and a repeat of the Alleluia but this was (incorrectly) omitted in the first 1886 edition – our rendition this evening will also omit the extra verse.

Somewhere In My Memory:Written by John Williams for the classic 1990 Christmas film Home Alone, the theme of 'Somewhere In My Memory' can be heard throughout Williams' Academy Award-nominated score, with the song itself nominated for the Oscar for Best Original Song. There are few tunes that evoke that 'gingerbread feeling' more strongly than this does!

The Orchestra

Die Fledermaus Overture:

This work is one of Johann Strauss II's most famous operettas, and is primarily loved for what happens before the curtain rises: the eight-minute overture is packed full of tunes from start to finish summarising the mischievous and comical nature of the operatta. Although literally translating to "The Bat", interestingly, the piece isn't about one; it is a reference to the root of all the trouble caused in the operetta... a practical joke where after getting royally drunk at a party, one of the main characters is forced to make his way home by daylight in a bat costume.

The Nutcracker Suite, Waltz of the Flowers & Trepak:

These highly famous dances are well-loved as some of Tchaikovsky's most popular compositions. The Trepak, otherwise known as the "Russian Dance", heavily features Russian and Ukrainian folk music, and is usually danced by two characters that burst into life on stage. Waltz of the Flowers occurs after the excitement of all the world dances, and presents a much calmer and softer contrast, albeit still filled with exciting builds of tension and release, with its sighing motifs, graceful entries and exciting grandioso ending.

Swan Lake Suite, Dance of the Little Swans & Mazurka:

Although short, the dance of the little swans is no doubt listed as one of the more memorable melodies within the ballet. One of the reasons for its popularity is how well the dance and music go together; four signets hold hands and dance gracefully together as one throughout the music. Listen out for the tiptoe of the bassoon underneath the orchestra at various passages; as the orchestra slowly builds up, starting with the oboes and finishing with a triumphant brass entry, the effect is a simple yet wonderful composition of a young and hesitant curiosity within the signets.

A Most Wonderful Christmas:

Originally composed for wind band, this energetic Christmas medley provides a jazzy twist on some classic festive tunes. The addition of strings in this arrangement provide a new depth to the harmonies, and with plenty of changes in pace and wonderful solos, you're sure to enjoy this selection of favourites.

How to Train Your Dragon:

From the same composer as great themes such as Chicken Run and Kung Fu Panda (alongside Hanz Zimmer), John Powell's score for this hit animation is an instant classic. The sweeping opening theme transports you straight to the clifftop Viking village of Berk, swiftly transitioning to a frantic flurry of Celtic melodies with dragons flying overhead. This thrilling selection of themes will definitely keep you on the edge of your seat.
